

SUVLA BAY


We have said good-bye to Anzac



In April 1915, Australian and New Zealand forces (the Anzacs) formed part of an allied expedition that set out to capture the Gallipoli peninsula, in order to open the Black Sea for the Allied navies in an unsuccessful effort to knock Turkey out of the Great War.

Over 8,000 Australian and 2,700 New Zealand soldiers died. To honour them, the 25th of April was thereafter known as Anzac Day.

Our dinner tonight observes that anniversary, and is held annually now at the instigation of our late branch President Alan Morris M.B.E

During the warfare a particular clash which has resonated in military history was The Battle of the Lone Pine. This took place between 16th and 18th August 1915. The battle took its name from a solitary pine that was left standing at the battle site after Turkish soldiers had cut down all the other trees to provide timber to cover their trenches. This tree was obliterated during battle but in memory of it another lone pine was planted in 1920.

In the Lone Pine Cemetery at Gallipoli, 1,167 Commonwealth (mostly Australian and New Zealand) servicemen are buried, while the imposing memorial lists the names of 4,900 others whose graves are not known.

HMS Gambia was commissioned in 1942 and in 1943 joined the New Zealand navy, as HMNZS Gambia, and stayed there until 1946 when she reverted to the Royal Navy. During her service with the New Zealand navy she earned battle honours at Sabang 1944, Okinawa 1945 and Japan 1945.. She fired the last round in the second world war when carrying out a 6" gun bombardment of Japan, after which she sailed into Tokyo Bay and was present when Japan signed the surrender.
