BORTH. Miss Jennie Davies. Trigfan. and Miss Martha Lloyd. Sunnyside, left on Monday to take up Red Cross work in Oswestry. A football match was played on Good Friday between an Aberystwyth team and the Borth team, the home team winning by three goals to one. Private T. Jones, Craigfryn and Seaman J. Brodigan have been home. The pupils of the National School sent a consignment of eggs to Netley Hospital so as to arrive on Easter Sunday, last week. Over 400 eggs altogether have been collected and about 600 cigarettes and sent to different hospitals, A letter has been received from France from a New Zealander and also an Englishman thanking the children.

Three boxes and a mast have been washed ashore at Borth, the boxes containing gun powder.

The total proceeds of the Y.W.C.A. day on Saturday, April 7th, amounted to £12 6s. 0d. The annual eisteddfod was held at Soar Chapel on Good Friday. The proceeds amounted to \$8.00 which will be devoted to the Y.M.C.A. The pulpit of Shiloh was occupied by the Rev. D.E.Jones, Blaenau Festiniog; of Soar by the Rev. O. H.
