## 1st November

Kragujevatz (North Serbia) taken by Austro-German forces.

Battle of Dvinsk ends.

## 2nd November

British Premier (Mr Asquith) declares Serbian independence to be an essential object of the war.

German airship "L.Z.-39" destroyed near Grodno.

BORTH. Obituary. This week a mournful gloom was cast over the village by the death of two well-known and notable inhabitants. On Friday morning the death occurred of Mr William R. Roberts 4, Cambrian-terrace. At the age of eighty-four years. He had been confined to bed for the past seven weeks. He was a native of Bethesda. Caernarvonshire, and came to Borth forty-one years ago when he opened business as a grocer and confectioner. He retired from business twelve years ago. For a period of thirty years he acted as precentor at, Libanus Chapel where he, had also occupied the position of deacon for the past fifteen years. In recognition of his valuable services he was presented with gold-rimmed spectacles and a purse of gold. He was a staunch Liberal. He had always taken the keenest interest in local affairs and was popularly referred to as the "Mayor of Borth". His wife predeceased him several years ago. He is survived by two sons, Mr. H. W. Roberts, Borth and Mr H. Roberts, Pencoed, Bridgend, and a daughter. Mrs Jenkins, with whom he resided. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at Penygarn. The Revs. J. C. Evans D. Caron Jones, and J. Llewelyn officiated at the funeral.

The death occurred on Sunday of Mr. Henry Stinchcombe at the age of sixty-seven years. He was a native of Gloucestershire. For twenty-six years he was stationmaster at Borth and removed to take up a similar position at Tylwch twelve years ago. While at Borth he delivered many lectures illustrated by lantern slides on the virtues of temperance. He was also a sidesman at St. Mathew's Church. He was nine years ago predeceased by his wife. He is survived by two sons, Mr G. W. Stinchcombe, at Llwyngwril, and Mr Walter Stinchcombe, who is employed on the L. and N. W. Railway clerical staff. The funeral took place at Llanfihangel on Wednesday when a number of old friends acted as bearers.

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
